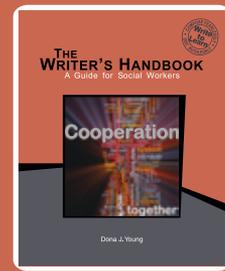

APA Checklist

SETTINGS

- 1-inch margins: top, bottom, and sides
- Double spacing throughout document
- Paragraph controls at 0 pt for spacing **Before** and **After**
- Paragraph indentation at 0.5 inches (1/2 inch)
- Times New Roman font, 12 points

RUNNING HEAD

- Running head: TITLE IN 50 CHARACTERS OR LESS in header
- In header on second pages: Title only, all caps, left
- In header on *all* pages: Page number, upper right corner

TITLE PAGE

- Title and by line centered on the upper half of page
- 12 or fewer words for title
- Times New Roman font, size 12, *not* in boldface

ABSTRACT

- One paragraph between 150-220 words
- No paragraph indentation for first line*
- Keyword summary (indent and italicize)

BODY

- Section titles: not in boldface font* (title, abstract, introduction, reference/s)
- Heading levels 1, 2, 3, and 4 in **boldface** font
- Two spaces after a period
- Margins blocked at left (not *full* justified)
- Paragraph indentation 0.5 inches (1/2 inch)

IN-TEXT CITATIONS

- Use author's last name and year of publication:
 - Jones (2010) found that at-risk youth were . . .
 - At-risk youth were likely to have issues with self-esteem (Jones, 2010).
 - In 2010, Jones' study showed that . . .
- In subsequent references within the same paragraph, the date is not necessary.

When a work has *two* authors, cite both names each time they are referenced:

- According to Jones and Smithe (2011), clients . . .

When a work has *three, four, or five* authors, cite all the first time; in subsequent references, use only the surname of the first author followed by *et al.*:

- Jones et al. (2011) demonstrated that . . .

For quotations 40 words or more, double space and indent left margin 0.5 inches; do not use quotation marks; put period before the citation. For short quotations, place the reference inside of the period:

- "Additional studies are needed to fill the gap" (Jones, 2010, p. 33).

For in-text citations using signal phrases, use the word *and*; for in-text citations that do not use signal phrases, use the ampersand (&) if cited at the end of sentence.

REFERENCE PAGE

- List references in alphabetical order; leave individual references in the order noted in the article or book
- Use last name and first initial (no first names)
- *For books:* author's last name and initials, publication date, title of work, and publication data: Jones, S., & Barker, D. (2012). *Title*. City, ST: Publisher.
- Block the first line of each reference at left margin
- Indent second lines of references 0.5 inches (hanging indentation)
- Capitalize only the first word of book titles, the first word after a colon (subtitle), proper nouns, and proper adjectives
- Type the title of a book in *sentence case*, the title of an article in *sentence case*, and the title of a journal in *title case*
- Italicize the title of a book and the title of a journal and its volume number
- For references, use the ampersand (&), not *and*
